JANETTE DEAN AWARD RECIPIENTS – Sheila and Don Fowler

A reception was held on Saturday January 9th when the Janette Dean Award was presented. The reception was attended by over twenty people; in addition to several OBBA Board Members, the Hawk Cliff Raptor Banding Group was well represented. There were also several other friends and well wishers in attendance. This award is typically presented at the OBBA AGM, but we were advised some time ago that this year’s recipients would be out of the country at that time this February.

In 1970 Sheila and Don Fowler were asked by Bob Hubert and Marshall Field if they would be interested in trapping and banding raptors. They showed interest and after visiting Hawk Cliff to see the operation became members. They have remained very in the Hawk Cliff Raptor Banding Group since that day. In fact at the first official meeting of the organization Sheila agreed to be the Secretary Treasurer, a position she still holds.

Since that day they have each banded a truly significant number of migrating hawks. Given the number of American Kestrels Don has taken out of the nets it is a wonder that he has any fingers left from all the bites they have given him over the many years he has maintained Station 5, which sits on the shore of Lake Erie. Sheila being of the fairer and gentler sex has preferred tangling with larger birds particularly Red-tailed Hawks at Station 3. It is said, that on one occasion on catching an eagle, and having no large can to keep it in, she removed her belt and fastened it around the bird in order to immobilize it while she dealt with it.



At one time they were both involved in banding migrating hawks close to the Niagara Escarpment near Hamilton. Sheila and Don also were among the first in the St. Thomas area to maintain a Kestrel nest box trail.

They are both avid travelers particularly to Western Canada and Florida, and keen birders wherever they are. They typically make a trip to see their daughter in Florida at the time of American Thanksgiving. Their fellow banders at Hawk Cliff always willing to share information with their friends are always keen to see Sheila and Don return, so they can tell them of all the good hawks they missed in their absence.

Don has to be the most dedicated bander in the group. When everyone else has long gone for home he will stay till late in the day at Station 5 patiently waiting in the hope that a flight will occur. Sheila will often go to keep him company – she probably thinks that if she didn’t she would scarcely see him at all.

We wish them well and may they both continue to see, catch and band many more raptors in the future.
